Challenge #1

Students and teachers as co-creators of knowledge

- Teacher: provider of knowledge -> facilitator of learning
- Students: involved in the redesign of learning processes
- Institution: support staff training in AL and value teacher's commitment

Challenge #2

Redesigning the learning environment for and through active learning

- Flexible learning environments (formal an informal)
- Exploit technology to broaden the definition of learning space

Challenge #3

Establishing learning communities

- Universities = learning organisations with multiple stakeholders
- Invest in university networks
- Develop dialogue with local, regional, national and international communities

Conclusions

- Active learning has the potential to fundamentally shift the way universities take responsibility as drivers of societal and educational changes
- Active learning is an educational philosophy geared towards ensuring a development of students into active citizens with global engagement
