Programme

After completing their research, doctoral candidates can pursue many different career paths both inside and outside academia. Many will become highly qualified knowledge workers in and for the public and private sectors, while others will pursue careers in academia as the supervisors and academic scholars of tomorrow. Institutions are confronted with the task of best preparing the candidates for whatever their next career step may be.

The 2020 EUA-CDE Thematic Workshop will focus on academic career development and the question of how universities can support doctoral candidates and postdoctoral researchers heading toward careers in academia and what challenges are involved. In particular, the emphasis will be upon career challenges faced in a changing and highly competitive sector. This includes topics such as skills training for postdoctoral researchers, teaching careers in universities, mental health support, the gender dimension and sustainability in researchers' careers. The workshop will also serve as a forum to present the EUA-CDE Thematic Peer Group on Career Development and Tracking.

This event will provide an occasion to discuss these issues and identify innovative solutions together with other EUA-CDE members. It will be of interest to anyone with responsibilities and interest in doctoral education at the institutional, faculty or discipline-specific level including academic leaders, doctoral education professionals and doctoral candidates.
