Universities UK

Universities UK is the voice of <u>141 universities</u> across all four UK nations – England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

Our mission is to help UK universities be the best in the world, through their research and teaching, and the positive impact they have locally, nationally and globally.

We aim to shape policy that allows universities to deliver the greatest impact possible for students, staff, the economy, and the communities they serve.





How are UK universities funded?

How are universities funded?

- Home student fees £9,250 p/a.
- International student fees uncapped but ranging from £11,400 £38,000 p/a (sometimes higher).
- **Teaching grant** previously made up a significant amount of HE funding but now reduced.
- Research funding research grants & contracts
- Other events, property, donations, endowment, etc







How the University earns its income

	Tuition fees and education contracts	43.7%
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Property income **26.8%**

Other income 16.1%

Investment income 6.2%

Funding body grants **5.3%**

Research grants and contracts 1%

Donations and endowments 0.9%

Coalition 2010-2015


- Austerity.

Conservative 2015-2024


- Brexit, Covid, high inflation.

What is the problem with university funding?

Funding per student, in tuition fees and teaching grants, has been falling over the last decade in England such that by 2025/26 funding per student will be the lowest in over 25 years and worth only £5,800 2011/12 prices.

Where next? UUK's Blueprint for Change

- UK General Election result and change in government provides a key opportunity to reset relations.
- The Blueprint (published on Monday) brings together all UUK's previous evidence and analysis into one place and sets out how the sector can work in partnership with the government to help achieve their aims.
- The document was overseen by experts who were external to the university sector, and who could therefore play a 'critical friend' role.
- The focus is not explicitly on funding, but on how we can create a UK university sector that is better in ten years' time than it is today.
- Sets out short-term stabilisation measures, before setting out an agenda for transformation – led by universities themselves and supported by government.

We face a choice. We can take the path which leads to better and stronger universities...or we can let them slide into decline.

We must choose the former path. This is not just government's responsibility. It is a shared responsibility.
